HLM4: process and next steps




- X May 13: The Zero Draft released. It made no reference to oral health
- May 17: FDI and IADR release joint advocacy priorities for HLM4
- May 22: FDI mobilizes its Council and allies to address the gap
- May 19 -27: FDI discusses the gap with governments at WHA78
- May 29: 1st compilation includes oral health, Bangkok Declaration etc.
- **June 13**: 2nd compilation with more reference to oral health released
- June 30: 1st Revised text with reference to oral health
- **July –Aug :** Intense closed-door negotiations to agree the final text starts

Objective



Objective of the Special Committee (GA 2024 Istanbul):

"Evaluate the effectiveness and fairness of the current membership formula and explore if there are any suitable alternatives that could be considered by members. Provide recommendations based on this evaluation to the General Assembly in 2025."

- > Explore suitable alternatives

- report during GA 2025



- first task the Special Committee did, was to look at what happens with other similar organizations at international level and ran a simulation with their membership fee formulas on FDI:
 - International Council of Nurses (ICN)
 - World Medical Association (WMA)
 - International Federation of Pharmacists (FIP)
 - World Physiotherapy (World Physio)
- also looked at the British Dental Association proposal (BDA) given during GA 2024
- Members provided a simulation that was discussed intensively regarding its transferability to FDI

Key findings



- Existing "formulas" do not fit to FDI
- i.e. discussed in previous meetings the current FDI fee calculation formula already offers the widest range of parameters for adjustments
 - ➤ i. e. the multiplier
 - > the wealth index used
 - > the threshold for the minimum fee;
- SC will look at the different parameters and possible adjustments aiming at a more balanced distribution of membership fees across countries;
- Idea of the minimum fee should be maintained to keep membership affordable for small members;
- SC should also consider the option of introducing a maximum fee to disburden the main payers;
- SC will also have to look on "political parameters" like voting rights.


Next steps



- Creation of a list of problems associated with the current formula
- Discussion of the possible (political) consequences arising from it
- SC will also have to look at "political parameters" like voting rights
- List the voting rights per member and consider the relevance of the numbers also in the context of the financial effort
- List the number of members per NDA vs dentists in their respective countries (representativeness)
 - > members with obligatory membership vs. members with voluntary membership
- Report during FDI GA 2025 (Shanghai)

Objective



Explore ways to facilitate remote participation simultaneously alongside face-to-face participation (further in the text - hybrid participation) for FDI delegates in the Open Forum, General Assembly and NLO Forum in situations in which in-person attendance is not feasible or possible for some individuals.



The committee looked at different possible scenarios and have identified 4.

We also received possible scenarios from Prof. Tsuruta, from Prof. Liu & Dr. Preston

Next steps



- Preliminary report will be part of the General Assembly binder (9th July)
- The Committee will continue the work and meet again in July to:
 - prepare the presentation to be done during General assembly
 - Work on the scenario implying to reduce the meeting duration
 - Discuss about the possibility to include proxy voting
- Based on the July meeting outcomes, FDI Head Office will initiate cost simulation for the 4 pre-selected scenario
- The committee chair will present a progress report during the World Dental Parliament in Shanghai
